The Match Girl's Christmas

(based on 'The Little Match Girl', by Hans Christian Andersen)

Scene 1 The Christmas Fair

[During the music, all actors enter informally, and head straight for seating area, apart from RICH & POOR CHILDREN (including CHILD 1-4), who stay out of sight. OLD TOM moves to his stage block. SELLERS act as if selling – or really sell – their wares. TOWN CRIER, MR. JONES & MAYOR take up prominent positions ready to open the Christmas Fair. All may speak to each other, to appear natural.]

BRASS BAND CAROLS (Instrumental) (© Track 1/11)

	[As TOWN CRIER rings his bell, all turn to face him. Note : Oyez means 'hear ye'. It may be pronounced either 'ohyes' or – more commonly – 'ohyay'.]
TOWN CRIER	(ringing bell) Oyez, oyez! Pray silence for Mr Jones and the worshipful Mayor of[your local town].
MR JONES	Happy Christmas everyone! And thank you for coming out on such a cold night! It's time to open our Christmas fair, and I'm going to hand straight over to the Mayor!
	[MR JONES leads applause, stepping back to look at MAYOR.]
MAYOR	Thank you Mr Jones! I can hardly believe another year's gone by and it's Christmas again! The [your town] Christmas fair is always a great start to the festive season. So – without further ado – I declare this Christmas Fair (points to TOWN CRIER) open!

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[TOWN CRIER rings bell again as all cheer.]

ALL Hooray! MR JONES Thank you Mr Mayor. (addressing crowd) The traditional Nativity play will be starting in a few minutes. In the meantime we have lots of last-minute Christmas bargains on sale, and mince pies to buy... **MAYOR** (wagging finger) ... And keep an eye out for Old Tom, the chestnut seller!

> [TOWN CRIER to seating area. POOR CHILDREN (incl. CHILD 1, 2, 3 & 4) enter to the music, skipping, dancing etc. As they sing they keep active, spread out in groups around the whole performing area. Some might mime throwing snowballs or do clapping games as they sing. While all this is happening, MR JONES & MAYOR wander around informally together, or else go to seating area. SELLERS finish selling, put trays of wares aside and join in with the others.]

Hot chestnuts! There's nothing better when Christmas is coming!

CHRISTMAS IS COMING

Poor Children (+ Chorus Left)

MR IONES

CHRISTMAS IS COMING, THE GOOSE IS GETTING FAT! PLEASE PUT A PENNY IN THE OLD MAN'S HAT. IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT A PENNY A HA'PENNY WILL DO. IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT A HA'PENNY THEN GOD BLESS YOU! CHRISTMAS IS COMING, THE GOOSE IS GETTING FAT! PLEASE PUT A PENNY IN THE OLD MAN'S HAT.

[RICH CHILDREN enter, singing.]

Rich Children (+ Chorus Right) BRIGHTLY SHINING CHRISTMAS STAR, Poor Children (+ Chorus Left) HOW I WONDER WHAT YOU ARE.CHRISTMAS IS COMING! UP ABOVE THE WORLD SO HIGH,CHRISTMAS IS COMING! LIKE A DIAMOND IN THE SKY. CHRISTMAS IS COMING, THE GOOSE IS GETTING FAT! BRIGHTLY SHINING CHRISTMAS STAR, PLEASE PUT A PENNY IN THE OLD MAN'S HAT. HOW I WONDER WHAT YOU ARE. Rich Children (+ Chorus Right) Poor Children (+ Chorus Left) BRIGHTLY SHINING CHRISTMAS STAR. CHRISTMAS IS COMING, THE GOOSE IS GETTING FAT! PLEASE PUT A PENNY IN THE OLD MAN'S HAT. HOW I WONDER WHAT YOU ARE. IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT A PENNY A HA'PENNY WILL DO.CHRISTMAS IS COMING!CHRISTMAS IS COMING! IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT A HA'PENNY GOD THEN BLESS YOU! BRIGHTLY SHINING CHRISTMAS STAR, CHRISTMAS IS COMING THE GOOSE IS GETTING FAT! HOW I WONDER WHAT YOU ARE. PLEASE PUT A PENNY IN THE OLD MAN'S HAT. [All children sit where they are. OLD TOM stands. NARRATOR moves to prominent position by Nativity area.]

OLD TOM (shouting out) Chestnuts! Hot chestnuts!

CHILD 1 (jumping up, pointing) Look! It's Old Tom!

[CHILD 2, 3 & 4 also stand to watch OLD TOM.]

OLD TOM Get your chestnuts here!

CHILD 2 I love hot chestnuts... and he tells fantastic stories!

CHILD 3 Does he?

[CHILD 1, 2, 3 and 4 run to stand below OLD TOM.]

OLD TOM Chestnuts! Hot chestnuts!

CHILD 3 (loudly) Tell us a story, mister.

OLD TOM Sorry, I'm busy! Chestnuts! Hot chestnuts!

CHILD 4 (loudly) Oh, go on! <u>Please</u> tell us a story!

OLD TOM (gruffly) Get away with yer!

CHILD 3 & 4 Please?

OLD TOM (irritated) Can't yer see I'm busy? Some of us 'ave work to do!

CHILD 2 But we <u>love</u> your stories...

CHILD 1, 2, 3, 4 And it is Christmas...

OLD TOM (sighs, hands to hips) Oh all right then. But just a short one.

CHILD 1 & 2 (excitedly) Yes!

CHILD 3 & 4 Thanks, mister!

OLD TOM (indicating) Sit yourselves down here.

[CHILD 1, 2, 3, 4 climb onto stage block and sit facing OLD

TOM, who sits on a low stool.]

Here have a chestnut. Watch out, they're very hot!

[OLD TOM mimes giving a hot chestnut to each child. They mime

feeling the chestnuts very hot in their hands.]

Scene 2 Two Stories Begin

CHRISTMAS IS COMING (incidental) (⊙ Track 3 / 13)

[Music continues under dialogue. OLD TOM could read from a book if necessary, but best if he speaks from memory. MATCH GIRL enters through crowd to sit down by lamp post, pulls shawl closely around her. MR JONES moves to prominent position. MAYOR to seating area. NARRATOR to Nativity area.]

Old Tom (speaking over music) It was Christmas Eve. Snow had been falling all

day and it was very cold. A poor little girl was dressed in rags and had

no shoes on her feet. She struggled along the freezing streets.

Child 1 Why was she out on such a cold day?

Old Tom She had matches to sell. She also had a cruel father who would beat

her if she went home without any money.

Child 2 What a horrible man!

Old Tom He was. But now close your eyes! Can you imagine the Match Girl?

Child 1, 2, 3, 4 Yes!

Old Tom Imagine she's here... Sitting by the lamp post.

Child 1, 2, 3, 4 (imagining, with eyes shut) Oh yes!

Child 4 (still with eyes shut) She looks very cold!

[As music ends, TOWN CRIER rings bell again.]

TOWN CRIER (ringing bell) Oyez, oyez, oyez! Pray silence for Mr Jones!

MR JONES Thank you, Mr Town Crier! Now – if you would all like to sit down.

It's time for the Nativity play. Let's give the cast a warm welcome.

[MR JONES leads applause as he moves to seating area. RICH &

POOR children sit facing Nativity area in groups.]

NARRATOR Every year, in December, we remember the story of Christmas.

We begin our play by going back in time, to a little town in Israel

called Bethlehem.

[ANGELS – and ANIMALS if you choose – move to Nativity area during the music. Children remain sitting as they sing.]

O LITTLE TOWN... / MATCHES

(• Track 4 / 14)

MATCH GIRL wanders

between groups, trying

to sell matches but is

ignored

Chorus O LITTLE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM,

HOW STILL WE SEE THEE LIE.

ABOVE THY DEEP AND DREAMLESS SLEEP

THE SILENT STARS GO BY.

YET IN THE DARK STREETS SHINETH

THE EVERLASTING LIGHT.

THE HOPES AND FEARS OF ALL THE YEARS

ARE MET IN THEE TONIGHT.

[Chorus repeat, humming, as MATCH GIRL sings. If possible she walks slowly while singing, apart from 'I'm freezing cold' section.]

Match Girl MATCHES! BUY MY MATCHES!

MATCHES! BUY MY MATCHES!

I'M FREEZING COLD AND STARVING.

THEY'RE ONLY A PENNY A BOX...

MATCHES! BUY MY MATCHES!

MATCH GIRL slowly walks back to the the lamp post

[Music continues under dialogue. MARY & JOSEPH enter. INNKEEPERS take well separated places, ready for MARY & JOSEPH to approach them during song. INNKEEPER 1 or 2 might stand on Stage Block (b). INNKEEPER 3 should stand nearest to the Nativity area (a).]

Child 1 (sadly) The Match Girl's gone back to the lamp post.

Child 2 No-one's buying her matches...

Old Tom Everyone's enjoying Christmas. They're too busy to notice her...

[Music ends.]

NARRATOR When Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem, it was very busy.

They couldn't find anywhere to stay.

[RICH & POOR CHILDREN stand to sing, facing MARY, JOSEPH & INNKEEPERS who must always be visible.]

RAT, TAT, RAT-A-TA-TAT (⊙ Tracks 5 / 15) Chorus RAT, TAT, RAT-A-TA-TAT MARY & JOSEPH AT MY WINDOW SHUTTERS, approach INNKEEPER 1 KNOCK! KNOCK! AT MY DOOR. and all mime knocking WHO'S THAT TAPPING AT MY WINDOW SHUTTERS, KNOCK! KNOCK! AT MY DOOR? INNKEEPER 1 shakes his head Innkeeper 1 THERE'S NO USE A-KNOCKING, I'VE NO ROOM TO SPARE AND I REALLY DO NOT CARE. Chorus THERE'S NO USE A-KNOCKING, HE'S NO ROOM TO SPARE AND HE REALLY DOES NOT CARE. BUT JOSEPH SAID: Joseph PLEASE WILL YOU HELP US? WE'RE TIRED AND WORN. INNKEEPER 1 shakes his HAVE YOU A PLACE WHERE head and points to OUR CHILD CAN BE BORN? **INNKEEPER 2 Chorus** RAT, TAT, RAT-A-TA-TAT... (etc.) MARY & JOSEPH approach INNKEEPER 2, Innkeeper 2 THERE'S NO USE A-KNOCKING, as above NOT A SINGLE BED. SHOULD HAVE CALLED AND BOOKED AHEAD. Chorus THERE'S NO USE A-KNOCKING, NOT A SINGLE BED. SHOULD HAVE CALLED AND BOOKED AHEAD. BUT JOSEPH SAID: Joseph PLEASE WILL YOU HELP US? WE'RE TIRED AND WORN. HAVE YOU A PLACE WHERE INNKEEPER 2 shakes

head and points to INNKEEPER 3
